Community Impact Funds

Meeting the Needs of the Community, Today and Tomorrow

As our community evolves, the Foundation remains prepared to respond to both emerging opportunities and ongoing challenges. Through our four Community Impact Funds, we support trusted nonprofit partners working to ensure Juneau remains a strong, livable place for all. A gift to an Impact Fund helps meet today's needs while strengthening our community's future.

PARKS, TRAILS & RECREATION *Expands community-wide access to outdoor spaces and recreational opportunities.*



COMING IN 2026 The opening of Sít Yá Hít Cabin at the Mendenhall Campground, in collaboration with the U.S. Forest Service and National Forest Foundation.

In 2025, we celebrated the completion of the 13.3-mile Treadwell Ditch Trail renovation. This five-year project was accomplished by hundreds of community volunteers in partnership with Trail Mix, Alaska Department of Fish & Game, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, and City & Borough of Juneau.

HEALTH & SOCIAL SERVICES *Ensures Juneau's nonprofits continue to offer essential services to help individuals and families meet their basic needs, overcome challenges, and build a strong and sustainable future.*

In 2025, the fund assisted Family Promise in purchasing a home to provide temporary accommodations for families seeking long-term housing, and office space to support the organization's operations and services.

COMING IN 2026 Partner with the Juneau School District and Gastineau Human Services to meet increasing food needs through our Feeding Juneau Kids Fund.



YOUTH & EDUCATION *Strengthens youth and lifelong learners by expanding access to education and workforce development opportunities.*

COMING IN 2026 Focus on collaboration to enhance young adults' access to technical education training, career guidance, and livable wage jobs. Fund scholarships and bus passes through the Zach Gordon Youth Center for low-income youth to participate in camps, activities, and jobs.

Local training provides individuals with the skills they need to step into stable career paths, providing a robust workforce that strengthens Juneau by ensuring critical services remain available in town. In 2025, the fund provided \$40,000 to SERRC's Trades Training Program, which offers pathways in health care, behavioral health, welding, construction, and commercial drivers' licenses.



ARTS & CULTURE *Fosters a dynamic array of arts and cultural opportunities.*

In addition to \$25,000 in Artist Awards granted to six artists and collaboratives through our Arts Vibrancy Endowment, in 2025 the Foundation awarded more than \$100,000 in honor of our 25th Anniversary to 20 local arts and culture organizations.

COMING IN 2026 Support for local artists who enrich our cultural landscape by creating a variety of vibrant, educational, and entertaining experiences through the Arts Vibrancy Endowment.

Nature and Cultural Resources



For Deb Rudis, “community” is a fabric woven of individual effort and shaped by local nonprofits. Deb spent her professional career as a wildlife toxicologist while volunteering for a variety of local organizations and causes.

“To build community, you can donate money or time,” she says. “Many people volunteer with groups that support aspects of life here they value most.” For her, it’s been about expanding access to Juneau’s natural and cultural resources.

Many in town may know Deb as a friendly usher who helped them find their seat at the symphony, as a race organizer at a running event, or as a Ski Patrol member who came to their rescue at Eaglecrest. Often volunteering for causes that align with her

love of the outdoors, Deb held a leadership role with Juneau Trail and Road Runners, completed 35 annual bird banding surveys, and serves on the board of the Southeast Land Trust. Equally devoted to Juneau’s cultural resources, she has served on the board of the Juneau Symphony.

In addition to her hands-on activism, Deb is happy to be in a position at this stage of her life to donate money. Looking over a map showing locations where Foundation funds have added value (see inside back cover), she remarked, “This makes clear just how deeply the Foundation touches every part of town. The first year I received the annual report and saw all the different funds, and all they focused on, I was amazed.”

What keeps her giving? “There’s the feeling of personal satisfaction when you give,” says Deb.

It’s mainly about being part of a place where people don’t do things just for themselves. That’s what makes our community remarkable.

See Your Legacy Gift at Work Today and Tomorrow

A legacy gift, whether made during your lifetime or through a bequest, builds our community’s capacity to support sustainable, positive change. When donors establish legacy gifts during their lifetime, they can see their generosity strengthening systems, partnerships, and lives today, while also creating an enduring resource for the future.

Endowments are designed with the long view in mind. They allow the Foundation to move beyond individual grants and play a broader role in aligning partners, identifying gaps, and supporting solutions that no single organization could advance alone. This systems-level approach reflects the deeper purpose of a community foundation and the kind of impact we strive to achieve every day.

The value of this approach is clear in the Juneau Hope Endowment, devoted to health and social services. Since the creation of this endowment in 2014, the Foundation has annually convened over 30 nonprofits and agencies to determine shared priorities for distributing more than \$10 million to programs essential to the well-being of our most vulnerable neighbors. Made possible by a legacy gift established during the donor’s lifetime, this fund has strengthened

collaboration, leveraged existing assets, and supported shared outcomes across our social services system.

More recent legacy gifts made during donors’ lifetimes help the Foundation to foster similar collaboration in vocational and trades training. These endowments support coordination among critical education providers, employers, nonprofits, and community leaders to prepare residents for in-demand, family-wage careers.

For some donors, establishing a legacy gift during their lifetime offers a rare opportunity to see their values in action today, while helping to build a stronger community for generations to come.



Cris & Jamie Waste *A Tradition of Giving*

In the early 1990s, with their young children in school and money tight, Cris and Jamie Waste contributed to their community through hands-on service: coaching youth activities, volunteering in schools, and offering professional expertise by serving on nonprofit boards. That habit of showing up has remained constant as their lives have become tightly interwoven with their community and their capacity for contributing time and money has grown.

Cris's commitment to caring began in her teens, when she volunteered to help administer vaccinations in Nicaragua. Her subsequent career in health care and current volunteer work for St. Vincent de Paul and Meals on Wheels reflect her lifelong belief in helping neighbors directly. Jamie's path has been defined by communication and connection through his career in public media and many years of Rotary service.

The Juneau Community Foundation has been central to the Wastes' giving journey. Jamie previously worked for the Foundation and Cris served for years on the Foundation's Professional Advisory Committee, helping to evaluate and guide grants.

Family has also shaped their commitment to philanthropy. They now reap the rewards of their efforts, as they watch their three grandchildren thrive in the community they helped to strengthen. Their support for programs like universal school breakfast comes from seeing firsthand how inclusive, community-building services benefit all kids. Through every chapter of their lives, Cris and Jamie have remained grounded in the simple idea that giving is both a responsibility and a joy.

Marcelo Quinto, Jr. *Service Rooted in Culture*

Family, friends, and food define the life of Marcelo Quinto, Jr. The son of a Tlingit mother and Filipino father, Marcelo grew up supported by siblings and extended family. "I think that one thing I've been able to do is mix well with everyone. I enjoy meeting new people," he says.

We're raised to take care of each other. That's how our community works.

He proudly wears a Tlingit vest sewn by his sister Betty and featuring his Thunderbird crest on the back. A culturally rooted commitment to serving others set the rhythm for Marcelo's life from a young age. "I believe we need to give back to the community," he says.



Staff from the culturally-based Kin Support Program, Haa Yat'x'u Saani, help families in Southeast build and maintain healthy intergenerational relationships and keep children and youth safe, stable, and out of the foster system.

Except for his years in the Navy, college in Fairbanks, and a short time in Anchorage, Marcelo has remained in his hometown.



He and his late wife Nancy spent 57 years together, raising two children and welcoming five granddaughters.

For more than 40 years, Marcelo has actively carried forward the work of the Alaska Native Brotherhood, including serving as President of his local camp. He's also served on the Healing Hand Foundation and Goldbelt Corporation boards and represented Juneau statewide on the Drug and Alcohol Board and internationally at the Arctic Congress.

Marcelo spent much of his life at sea, many years as a fisherman then later as chief cook on the state ferry M/V Malaspina. He is well-known across the Juneau community for cooking at large community events. On October 26, 2024, he prepared meals for 400 guests gathered in Angoon to accept the U.S. Navy's historic apology for bombarding the village in 1882.

Whether it is helping extended family members, mentoring, or contributing meals to local fundraisers, Marcelo, now age 84, continues to contribute his time and talents to benefit others.

Mike Blackwell was one of the first people to establish a Donor Advised Fund, which helped start the Juneau Community Foundation. During his lifetime, Mike gave generously to local organizations like The Glory Hall, Discovery Southeast, and the Zach Gordon Youth Center. His sons, Andrew and Matthew, continue his legacy by contributing to and recommending grants from the Blackwell Fund that Mike began.

Gordon Vernon Libraries played a defining role in Gordon Vernon's youth. Now, through the Book Hook Fund he established, he's helping rural libraries expand their collections

and inspiring new generations of readers. Gordy sees giving not just as generosity but as gratitude in action.

Carolyn V. Brown, MD, MPH Working as volunteer physicians in Kenya for two years left a lasting impact on George and Carolyn Brown. Upon returning to Juneau, they established a nonprofit to provide scholarships for Kenyans pursuing programs in medicine and careers helping fellow Kenyans to live healthy happy lives. Their legacy lives on in the Dr. George Brown Health Scholarship Endowment, established by Carolyn because of her devotion to the health and vitality of her community and beyond.

Mandy and Anthony Mallott *Ancestry, Community and Heart*

Born and raised in Juneau, Mandy (Achkw'ei) and Anthony (Gunnuk') Mallott carry with them a deep sense of belonging, gratitude, and responsibility for the people who raised them and the places that shaped them. Upon returning after 15 years away, they witnessed the ways a small community can be strengthened through relationships and giving.

Our parents' teachings guide how we move through the world, how we give and lift up others. Now it's our responsibility to pass along their knowledge. —Mandy

Now, after having raised three children in Juneau, the two agree parenting has placed them in their most meaningful community role—one that continues to connect them to schools, youth programs, and a broad network of people committed to instilling Native values in each upcoming generation.

The couple's shared philosophy of philanthropy is grounded in Alaska Native principles: work together, avoid duplication, and focus resources where the need is greatest and the impact will be most powerful. Sometimes the gift is financial, but often they believe what is needed is a time commitment, a perspective, or the forging of a connection.

Anthony's service on the Rasmuson Foundation board and Mandy's longtime leadership on the Juneau Community Foundation board have sharpened their awareness that real philanthropy centers community voices.

A community foundation elevates the community's voices. It builds its mission on the community's needs. That's very Native in its thinking. —Anthony

The Byron Mallott Haa Shuká—Future Generations Fund honors Anthony's father by supporting programs that reflect his values and life's work. For the Mallotts, giving is about elevating others, strengthening traditional culture, and ensuring that Juneau remains a place where everyone feels they belong.

There are many ways to build community. Reid Harris provides a powerful example by bringing interest, expertise, and volunteers together to enrich the lives of others. Reid's giving started long before he wrote a check.

Born and raised in Juneau, Reid returned after college with a renewed appreciation for the community that shaped him. That sense of belonging now fuels his work as president of the Juneau Mountain Bike Alliance, an all-volunteer group dedicated to creating access to mountain biking for everyone, especially younger riders.

For me, philanthropy has always been as much about giving time as making monetary donations.

A couple years ago, Reid and other riders noticed that while most Juneau families reside in the Mendenhall Valley there were no nearby mountain biking opportunities. He believed families shouldn't have to drive across town to get on a good trail. With his enthusiasm, the Thunder Mountain Bike Park, a collaborative effort with Trail Mix and City & Borough of Juneau, quickly became the Alliance's signature project.

Bringing professional trail builders to town, securing equipment, and purchasing materials would require more than vision and passion. The Community Foundation's knowledge and funding helped bring in experts and materials. Volunteers showed up in force and the first trail was completed in just three weeks.


